Ok, now that the WSSA 2018 Expo is behind us, it is time to focus on the 2018-2019 snow season. This is where you should be on your checklist: 1.) Register your snowmobiles now. 2.) Make sure your trailer tabs are current. 3.) Get Discover Pass. 4.) Check to make sure your snowmobile insurance is good to go; sleds are very expensive! 5.) Make reservations at the destinations you plan on staying at ASAP as they all fill up by Thanksgiving. You should have already purchased your needed supplies at Expo, however if you did not, you can go to the Expo website (www.wssaexpo.com) and see a list of all the exhibitors that participated in the event this year; it will be available to you all year. The last on the list is to have a great time and be safe out there.

As a reminder, WSSA officer elections are coming real soon. Voting is done online since last year. I encourage you to make sure you can log in to your WSSA account now, so you know when the time comes to vote, you will be good to go. The Membership Co-Chairs can help you with the details.

I will be running for WSSA President this year and I seek your support in voting for me. I hope my experience, stability and dedication to this organization will convince you how serious I am about this position. You can call me most anytime if you have any questions that need answers before you vote. Thank you in advance for this opportunity to run as a candidate.


I haven't had a chance to talk with the Apple Country Club, but I'm sure they're getting ready to start groomer maintenance; more info next report.

Greetings everyone in



The Trac Riders received some great news a few weeks ago. They received a very generous donation from a very kind family in our local community so they could buy all the



Because this is the last show for the 2018




Dick Feil won 1st Place People's Choice at the WSSA Expo with his restored antique Arctic Cat.

Cascade Drift Skippers

Greetings all! The snow is starting to make an appearance on the tips of the mountain tops at Snoqualmie Pass, so we're

anxiously awaiting getting out on the snow. As we wait (not so patiently), we have kicked off the 2018-2019 season with our first couple of meetings, and of course the annual WSSA Snow Show!

Our October meeting featured information on pre-season preparations and sled maintenance to hit the ground running. Some of the key tips included:

1.) Physical fitness prep - not only for your ability to maneuver your machine, and to dig out stuck sleds, but more importantly - in

the event of an emergency. How long and how fast could you locate, dig, extricate, and perform rescue activities for your buddies buried in an avalanche?

- 2.) Refreshing your avalanche knowledge and brushing up on those rescue skills. If you haven't yet, be sure to set up a free account on Backcountry Ascender (backcountryascender.com). This is a great and fun way to review and increase your avalanche awareness. For additional training, we highly recommend on-the-snow courses in avalanche rescue skills and Level 1 avalanche certification being offered this winter at The Last Resort.
- 3.) Assessing all your riding gear. Helmets, gloves, goggle, boots, jackets, pants, etc.; inspect for wear and replace as necessary. Airbags; test deploy and refill cylinder; ensure you know how to repack your bag. Transceivers; install fresh batteries, complete any software updates, and test. InReach, SPOT satellite communication and GPS devices; renew subscriptions, charge battery, update software, and test. Radios; charge, set up pre-set club and emergency channels, and test.
- 4.) Setting up your tunnel bag and backpack. The three most critical essentials are transceiver/beacon, shovel, and probe. These essentials should be carried on your person. In a rescue scenario, you will need immediate access to these tools, and if you should become separated from your sled, you could lose precious time trying to locate these items. Ten other essential items to carry on you or on your sled: 1-Navigation and communication - radios are a MUST for our rides! 2-Insulation - at minimum, an extra mid-layer and dry socks. 3-Illumination - a headlamp or flashlight. 4-First-aid supplies. 5-Fire - the ability to start a fire is important. There are several good solutions such as fire paste, lighters, and other fire starters. 6-Repair kit and tools. Could you replace a belt if you needed to? Or tighten/adjust loose parts? 7-Nutrition - granola, protein bars, or nuts are good options. The body needs food for energy in order to keep warm. 8-Hydration - a dehydrated person can lose up to 75% of their muscle strength. Carry enough fluids for yourself and a little extra for a riding partner if needed. 9-Emergency shelter - even a simple bivy could be a life saver. 10-Sun protection.
- 5.) Completing snowmobile maintenance: checking lights, flushing fuel, inspecting track tension, and tracking, topping off fluids, and checking for leaks, checking clutch and belt, checking shocks, cooling system, throttle, brake cables, cleaning carburetor, lubricating fittings, checking for cracks and wear in skid frame, suspension arms, and engine, and checking skis and carbides for wear.

What's next? Make a shopping list and hit some of the local dealer open houses! Then get out and ride!

I would like to express a huge word of thanks to all of our volunteers who staffed the WSSA Snow Show and supported the Cascade Drift Skippers' booth. We had a busy two days and enjoyed meeting people and enrolling new members. We had a great response to the BCA (Backcountry Access) bottle fill event, and were able to provide some education on bag set up as well.

We invite all our sled friends to join us for our November meeting, which will feature the ever popular Bag Pop! After a brief count-down, we will all 'let 'er rip' and pull our avalanche airbag cords! Then for those with BCA bottles, we will have an air tank to refill onsite. We will also have a presentation on GPS technology, and we will close the meeting by drawing the winners for our three \$200 gift cards! If you would like to become a member, and receive a free raffle ticket, please feel free to join us at the meeting.

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


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



ISMA Update

State of the Sport

Snowmobiling is a catalyst for winter economies in the Snowbelt of North America that generates over \$26 billion in annual spending by participants and providing jobs, taxes and recreation when many hibernate. Over two million recreationists enjoy snowmobiling in the U.S. and another 700,000 in Canada each year. The players are many and diverse, but they are all integral in moving the sport forward. They include:

- ➤ Individual Riders
- > Clubs
- > State and Provincial Associations
- > American Council of Snowmobile Associations (ACSA) and Canadian Council of Snowmobile Organizations (CCSO)
- ➤ International Snowmobile Manufacturers Association (ISMA)

ISMA's role is one of leadership from the four Original Equipment Manufacturers (OEM's) on issues that affect the sport, especially in the areas of laws and policy with governmental units on the manufacturer of products, and also with access and protection. Below are some of the ways the four OEM's are involved on a daily basis through ISMA:

- The manufacturers collectively helped establish and are significant supporters and contributors to the American Council of Snow mobile Associations and the Canadian Council of Snowmobile Organizations. These are the true activation arms for organization, political, and funding issues in their respective countries.
- ISMA's members, along with ACSA and CCSO, support clubs and associations in efforts to expand and protect trails, riding areas and other organized club activities. Financial support through grant programs and industry expertise and knowledge is available to support staff and volunteers.
- The ISMA Safe Riders program, sponsored by the manufacturers, began in 1995 and continues today. The program support materials are available free of charge to clubs, dealers, associations and safety trainers. The campaign includes, posters, brochures, safety videos and other materials.
- ISMA's avalanche safety education and outreach support began ten years ago. Three years ago, ISMA partnered with Ascender 360 to make education access even easier through an online program. ISMA supports and communicates on a regular basis with the American Avalanche Association, Avalanche Canada and the U.S. Forest Service avalanche safety training teams.
- ISMA introduced a new Safe Riders video series featuring 13 chapters covering key issues on snowmobile safety. The series supports safety education and market expansion. Clubs and associations are encouraged to use the new videos to promote membership as well as safety.
- The manufacturers, in cooperation with ACSA and the CCSO, work closely with land managers regarding trail management, main tenance, mountain riding designation, and proper postings.
- ISMA and ACSA have jointly intervened on behalf of states, clubs, riders and even the U.S. Forest Service over 12 times on land access issues, protecting riders when unnecessarily attacked. Especially in the Western U.S. The most recent example being our intervention in the Over Snow Vehicle Plan in the Lassen Forest in California within the past year.
- ISMA and ACSA have been involved since 1999 in numerous lawsuits preserving the right to ride in the oldest national park, Yellowstone to assure the precedent set there is one of inclusion.
- ISMA has sponsored scientific studies that have proven no detrimental effects of snowmobiling on soil, vegetation, or wildlife.
- ISMA continually sponsors economic impact studies to show the importance of winter recreation to towns, counties, and states in the snow-belt region.
- The manufacturers continue to develop snowmobile engines that are clean. New snowmobiles have EPA certified engines, which insure clean air and water and healthy recreation.
- Sound levels and emission levels continue to decline in snowmobiles with new state-of-the-art exhaust and related sound sys tems. All snowmobiles pass a rigorous set of safety tests including sound and emission testing. The tests are conducted by a recognized independent third-party testing laboratory.
- ACSA and CCSO, with support from ISMA, organize a Fly-In every year to Washington D.C. and numerous receptions in Ottawa to personally visit the lawmakers and Ministers from snowmobiling states and provinces reminding them of the importance of snow mobiling and giving them updates on snowmobiling activities in their states and provinces.

While the manufacturers play an important role, our sport is dependent on volunteers to make it work. ISMA encourages all snowmobilers to support the sport in some small way whenever possible – no matter if you live in Alberta, Colorado, New Brunswick or New York, there are many other snowmobilers volunteering on your behalf. Make your voice heard too by joining a local snowmobile club, a state or provincial association, and ACSA or CCSO – even if you can only contribute with your dollars. It all truly helps.

Salmon-Challis National Forest

As part of the Forest Plan Revison, Plan Initiation Workshops have been scheduled.

In case you missed it:

In case you've missed the last few weeks of conversation and panic in Teton County, Wyoming, the County Board of Commissioners did not have the votes necessary this week from the Wyoming Public Lands Initiative Committee to recommend new Wilderness. 97% of Teton County is public land and over 80% of that land is already closed to mechanized and motorized use.

Good reminder to be involved on the local level! Know the decision makers at all levels, local, state and federal.

This battle is only the beginning... Forest Planning will be coming soon. That is a long process -- but so very important. We will need everyone to be engaged for that!

Department of Interior: Secretary of Interior Ryan Zinke said the department saved \$2.5 Billion from changes in regulations. He said that revoking a methane emissions rule alone would save between \$1.4 billion and \$1.6 billion. The governors of two states and numerous environmental groups have filed lawsuits against Zinke's methane emissions rule of September 18th for failing to assess the global costs of the pollution from methane emissions. The rule largely revokes an Obama administration rule. The Interior Department said it is preparing a number of additional cost-saving regulations, including actions to revise critical habitat designations for threatened and endangered species.

Changing Places ~~ Changing Faces

It was finally made official, Vicki Christiansen was appointed U.S. Forest Service Chief. As you may recall, Vicki was appointed Interim Chief last March and addressed the ACSA Fly-In in April. She comes from the state and private forestry industry from Washington and Arizona. She has many issues in front of her, but recreation seems to be one she is very supportive of on Forest Service lands.

Leslie Weldon is now the Work Environment and Performance Executive for the U.S. Forest Service. Prior to her current position, she served as Deputy Chief, National Forest System, where she was responsible for oversight of the National Forest System, comprised of 154 National Forests and 20 National Grasslands covering 193 million acres located in 44 states and Puerto Rico.

Chris French is now the Acting Deputy Chief, National Forest System. In addition to this role, Chris continues in his previous role as Director, Ecosystem Management Coordination.

Glenn Casamassa was appointed to the position of Regional Forester for the Pacific Northwest Region. As regional forester, Casamassa will oversee management of 16 National Forests, two



National Scenic Areas, a National Grassland, and two Na-

tional Volcanic Monuments within the states of Oregon and Washington.

The new Yellowstone National Park Superintendent has arrived. Cam Sholly has officially taken the reins from Dan Wenk.

Trump plans to nominate Aurelia Skipwith, a former Monsanto executive, to be Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. She is currently the deputy assistant secretary for fish, wildlife and parks. Skipwith is a biologist and lawyer who spent more than 6 years at agriculture giant Monsanto. She joined the Department of Agriculture in 2013. "During the past 18 months as deputy assistant secretary, I have had the distinction to work with dedicated people of the service to ensure the implementation of this administration's and Secretary Zinke's policies to protect our species, increase public access, and ensure science is at forefront of our decisions," she said in a statement.

The Bureau of Land Management has chosen Jamie Connell, most recently the BLM Oregon State Director, to head the Colorado State Office. Replacing Connell in Oregon will be Chris McAlear, assistant director of BLM's National Conservation Lands program.

Awards! Awards!

Snowmobiling could not function without the thousands of volunteers across the country. It is nice to recognize some of those outstanding individuals and companies at the International Snowmobile Congress each year.

Club of the Year: The Iowa Snowdrifters from Coralville, Iowa, were named the ACSA Club of the Year. The Snowdrifters have been developing and maintaining local snowmobile trails since the early 70's. The club attends and participates in events from club meetings to state association functions to local events like the Big Town Showdown Truck and Tractor Pull. They have a committee that works on the tractor pull that requires lots of volunteers and manpower -- which also serves as a fundraiser. The last event had 1,700+ attendees and raised \$14,000+ for trail funds. The Club also partners with organizations such as the Corp of Engineers and Friends of Coralville. These partnerships have resulted in projects for the local area that are not snowmobile related, such as walking trails and wild prairie restorations. They pride themselves on giving back to the local community. The club also introduces non-snowmobilers to the sport as well as encourages youth involvement.

Dealer of the Year: Pioneer Motorsport from Chaffee, New York, was named the ACSA Snowmobile Dealer of the Year. The dealership originally opened in 1964 with Hus Ski Snowmobiles. Since that time, the dealership has grown into one of the most elite dealerships in New York. Pioneer regularly hosts club meetings for several local clubs, as well as holding fundraising events and membership drives. Pioneer believes education is an important piece in selling snowmobiles. They promote any and all snowmobilers to get involved in their local club. In addition to educating buyers on how the snowmobile works, they emphasize the need to join a club prior to registering a sled. They also have signs and posters in the dealership reminding riders to stay on the trail and respect the trails. The philosophy at Pioneer is leading by example. Plans are currently underway with the dealership taking the

There are also plans underway for a youth ride on private property prior to the trails opening. Owner Kyle Armstrong said, "We feel this would be a good way to take advantage of early snow and no traffic to allow the kids to get some riding in."

Snowmobiler of the Year: Arlyn Baumgarten from Kenosha, Wisconsin, was named ACSA Snowmobiler of the Year. Baumgarten has been an active snowmobiler for many years and has been active in his local club, the Prairie Riders, as well as the Association of Wisconsin Snowmobile Clubs. In addition to serving in positions at the club level, county level and state level, he was recently appointed to serve on the Governor's Snowmobile Recreation Council. Baumgarten has been actively involved in all phases of snowmobiling. He helps secure landowner permission, he marks and maintains trails and serves on the planning committee. Believing the youth are our future, Baumgarten has been a supporter of the Kids and Adults on Snow (KAOS) since it's inception. He recruits youth to get involved as well as helping with youth projects and funding those projects. "Arlyn represents all that is the best in our sport" said AWSC President Dave Newman. "He knows what needs to be done and does it, never expecting credit. His satisfaction is knowing the work is done -- and done right."

Youth Snowmobiler: Rachel Watkins from Beresford, South Dakota, was named ACSA Young Snowmobiler of the Year. Rachel starting riding at a young age with her family. She is currently President of the state youth program, Youth Empowerment Through Involvement in Snowmobiling (YETIS). She has participated in many club events, state conventions and the International Snowmobile Congress. She has also worked at the Governor's Ride and the 20th Anniversary Open House at the Polaris Center. Snowmobiling is just one of the activities Rachel finds time for, in addition to high school sports, church youth group, teaching Sunday School and working part-time. Snowmobiling is family in Rachel's mind. "I ride snowmobiles because that's where I have made some of my best memories with family and friends." Rachel also looks to the future and realizes land access is an issue as well as getting young snowmobilers involved. Rachel says, "I chose to work toward the path of continued access and the opportunity for everyone to enjoy snowmobling like I do." SDSA President Jon Laframbois says, "With youth involvement and encouragement from young snowmobilers like Rachel, our future is bright!"

Snowmobile Family: Bill and Diana Rexford from Colorado were named ACSA Snowmobile Family of the Year. The Rexfords have been involved in snowmobiling for over 20 years. They regularly participate in club and county events, as well as the Colorado Snow-

mobile Association. They have been very involved from committees to holding elected position and have also helped with the newspaper and chairing raffles. The Rexfords have been proactive in challenges that they see, such as a lack of parking, and are always leading the charge in advocating for solutions to those challenges. Getting new members and the youth involved and educated has also been a priority. For over 20 years, the Rexfords have been constantly recruiting new members and promoting a positive image for snowmobilers. CSA President Scott Jones said, "They are faithful supporters for all ideas and actions that benefit snowmobiling. They have always been excited to see youth get involved - and they are especially excited seeing their children and grandchildren joining the ranks of snowmobiling!"

ACSA Updated Plans for Future:

After reviewing current materials and a survey of the members, ACSA members set a new planning framework into place. The Strategic Plan was part of the Annual Fly-In where all of the attendees participated in prioritizing goals for the future. The Plan was approved by the Board in May and implementation began at the ISC in Halifax.

New Goals include:

Members services, improving the brand, the website and continuing to develop new resource tools.

Communication goals including improving success stories, social media, and providing educational webinars.

Leadership goals are also a priority for leadership development and training, using the committee structure, and encouraging youth leadership.

Like all strategic plans, funding and membership are also included, improving the brand, clarifying membership categories, and pursuing new funding avenues. Also included is Chapter structure and function to advance the purpose and mission of ACSA and organized snowmobiling.

Several new committees were formed including Communications, Website, Membership and Resources. The committees will brainstorm ideas and suggestions to ultimately bring recommendations back to the Board for review and implementation. We are always looking for new ideas and new blood -- and would welcome any volunteers for any of these committees! Please contact the ACSA office! Strategic Planning is an on-going process. While it can be long and not very exciting, it is necessary for the organization to shape it's future.











Teanaway Community Forest Recreation Plan - For your review and comment. From a recent e-mail I received: "This proposal is for developing and managing recreation and public access in the Teanaway Community Forest for the next 15 years. It outlines a vision for recreation and public access by developing recreation management concepts, setting priorities, and presenting specific strategies and tools for implementation. The plan serves as a supplement to the May 2015 Teanaway Community Forest Management Plan. This non-project proposal covers 49,933 acres in portions of Township 20 North, Range 15 - 17 East; Township 21

North, Range 15 - 16 East; and Township 22 North, Range 16 East, W.M., Kittitas County.

Information about this proposal including the Threshold Determination, SEPA Checklist and Draft Recreation Plan can be accessed through DNR's (Department of Natural Resources) website at: www.dnr.wa.gov/teanaway-recreation- plan. Comments on this should be submitted by 5pm November 7th, 2018. A link to the public commenting portal can be found on the webpage above, or send comments to P.O. Box 47015, Olympia, Washington 98504-7015. Please include the file number listed above on all comments.

Public Lands Commissioner raising your taxes? Director Hillary Franz recently sent out a message touting a 'historic' \$55 million budget request for 'long-term investments in Washington's wildfire fighting force and forest health'. I think we are all in favor of improving our forests to reduce fire danger, but I'm concerned when the government wants to throw large amounts of money at the 'problem'. What makes a healthy, fire-resistant forest? Thinning. Thinning is logging, and logging brings IN revenue. So while I agree with the premise, I'm certainly concerned with plan. What is the plan? Make 30 seasonal firefighters permanent (good); adding two

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helicopters to DNR's fleet of eight for faster initial attack (good?...); funding full-time wildfire training staff (good); adding seven outreach specialists... (BAD-do-nothing government employees); and commit \$17 million to forest health projects laid out in DNR's 20-Year Forest Health Strategic Plan (BAD-it's called logging and should provide income, not cost the State). Well, at least she didn't blame the fires on 'man-made climate change'... oh, wait, she did...

Christopher Mayer of Cascade Drift Skippers fame and the developer of Backcountry Ascender, a game-based avalanche education app, recently presented at the International Snow Science Workshop (ISSW) 2018 in Innsbruck, Austria. What is ISSW? From their website: "The ISSW exists to facilitate the interdisciplinary exchange of ideas and experiences between snow science researchers and practitioners. The motto of the International Snow Science Workshop is 'A Merging of Theory and Practice'."

Municipal leaders pushing for recreational lanes on new international bridge. This was the headline. No, not in Washington. These forward thinkers are in Maine and New Brunswick. A new bridge connecting Madawaska (ME) and Edmundston (NB) is in the planning stages and local leaders are stressing the importance of a four season lane for bicyclists, snowmobilers and ATVers. "A joint resolution to work together to push state and provincial transportation representatives for a downtown location for the new bridge and for a design that would allow for foot and recreational traffic was signed." I don't know about biking in the region, but I've snowmobiled there and we are a boon to the local economies in the winter. ATVing in the region has grown by leaps and bounds as well. The current bridge dates to 1921 and currently carries a five-ton weight restriction, halting all heavy commercial traffic across it. Hope the decision makers are listening.
